AODA

The government enacted the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) in 2005, which set out a clear goal and timeframe to make Ontario accessible by 2025. The Act lays the framework for the development of province-wide mandatory standards on accessibility in all areas of daily life. Ontario has accessibility standards in five areas:

- Customer service
- Employment
- Information and communications
- Transportation
- Design of public spaces

Accessible customer service is about understanding that people with disabilities may have different needs and finding the best way to help them access goods and services.

In 2012 MVACL implemented these standards by means of updated;

- accessible customer service policies which included use of service animals and support
- persons
- practices and procedures
- customer feedback
- Staff training

The end of 2014 MVACL issued their Multi Year Accessibility Plan to meet the mandatory standards for AODA. It is accessible on our Website.



This year's objective is to meet the "Employment" Standard.

The Accessibility Standard for Employment will help make accessibility a regular part of finding, hiring and supporting employees with disabilities.

Organizations will have to:

- let job applicants know that recruitment and hiring processes will be modified to accommodate their disabilities, if requested.
- build the accessibility needs of employees into their human resources practices.
- create a written process for developing and documenting individual accommodation plans for employees with disabilities.
- help employees with disabilities stay safe in an emergency by providing them with individualized emergency response information when necessary.

Nicholas MacAuley - Re-Connecting in the North

Nicholas MacAuley has ancestral roots, through his dad, the late Ennis Crowe, to a Cree community on Hudson Bay in the NW corner of Ontario. There are no roads into this remote reserve except during wintertime when the Muskeg is frozen, so travel to and fro is by air (or a long haul along the waterways!)

In mid-July 2014, Nicholas and his mother Diana boarded the CN train in Toronto en route to Sioux Lookout, a 30 hour journey. They slept in a room with bunk-beds and had a washroom with an alarm button. The toilet was flushed by another similar button. You can imagine the confusion!

From Sioux Lookout, they flew with Wasaya Air into Fort Severn, where several family members were gathered to greet and transport them the mile or so into the village.

Nicholas and his mother stayed in a Teacherage in the school yard, which was across the road from the baseball field. To Nick's delight a baseball tournament was in progress during his first week in town, and he was welcomed to join in the fun.

Nicholas reunited with his family, especially with his 3 aunties, his 2 uncles and his brother Myers! They are wonderful people.

The highlight of the 2 week visit was their fishing expedition with George Kakekaspan on his big 4 wheeler. Travelling over rough, berry strewn mounds of moss and earth they motored 5 miles north to the Hudson Bay coast, then they crossed the Pippiwatin River where Nick caught a beautiful trout. Heading West through the Muskeg, a mother Polar bear and her two cubs were spotted in the distance. George accelerated and pretty soon Nick had a close up view of the magnificent creatures. Mother bear stood up on her hind legs to peer at her pursuers, wagging her head, then began to lope to the safe open water of the Bay, her yearlings at her heels. What a thrill to have been so close to these free beauties! Almost as exciting as seeing bears, Nicholas noticed 2 Sandhill cranes standing and flapping their wings.

Nick was invited to feast in his cousin's teepee. What great wild food! They ate goose, moose, caribou, whitefish, bannock, macaroni salad, cake and of course, tea. After eating the family played games and Nicholas chopped wood.

This journey has been such a special opportunity for Nicholas to re-connect to his family after a long absence. Nick says that his next trip will be to visit his brother Lucas, in California.

Personal Outcomes Measures Training



In the spring of 2014 MVACL and Community Living Upper Ottawa Valley were successful in attracting a Trillium Foundation grant to deliver Personal Outcome Measures training. This partnership will deliver training to staff in both agencies as well as representatives from other community based organizations.

The funding is for 3 years and the plan is to deliver 3 training events a year. 3 workshops have been delivered so far with the venue alternating between Pembroke and Barry's Bay. A total of 16 MVACL staff have participated and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive not just in terms of the training itself but how the learning will lead to improvements in the way we provide supports and services.

There will be additional training for selected staff with the aim of designating 2 'Reliable Interviewers' and 1 accredited Trainer for each agency by the end of the 3 year period.

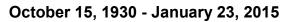
This means we will have the capacity to provide training to all staff in the organization.

The approach builds on the person directed planning which MVACL already facilitates. It adds value by providing a way for people who are supported to measure personal outcomes and determine themselves whether they are 'present' or 'not present.' The data collected during the assessment process is then used to identify how individual supports can be enhanced as well as how MVACL as an organization is able to make improvements.

People supported by MVACL are already benefitting from their involvement as interviewees in the training. Examples include a review of rights restrictions, a referral for specialist support and helping to increase natural supports through regular church attendance.
